## MUSICAL THEATRE CONCENTRATION COURSES

### Curricular Overview/Requirements/Major Completion Map

I was brought to CSU to create a Musical Theatre program for the school's Theatre division. I worked with my colleagues to propose, develop, and implement a new Concentration in Musical Theatre (Successfully launched Fall of 2022!) running concurrently with our Concentration in Performance within our Bachelor of Arts in Theatre degree. We shaped our curriculum and resources to fit the budget and personnel of Colorado State University's theatre faculty. This is a closed Concentration, meaning audition only, and the results have been more than gratifying. The interest level of students entering submissions for our program has skyrocketed, as has the talent level of those submissions.

#### PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Musical Theatre concentration is designed to offer students opportunities to practice and develop incremental techniques and skills necessary for the art form of Musical Theatre in 3 areas: singing, dancing, and acting. Students develop an understanding of the Musical Theatre Performer as a creative collaborator, visionary, and working artist. And as actors, students work on analyzing and performing contemporary and classical scripts and songs.

Students progress through a 3-part sequence of Musical Theatre History & Repertoire I & II, in which they learn about the history of the art, and practice, the art form; and Musical Theatre Scene-To-Song, where they integrate their studies. This progression is rounded out with Text Analysis, Theatre History (I or II), as well as electives in Directing, Playwriting, Dramaturgy, Internships, and Design courses.

Students progress through an acting sequence, including Acting I and II and the advanced topic — Scene-to-Song, which is the equivalent of Acting III for Musical Theatre majors. The capstone class is TH450 Professional Actor Prep. In the senior year, students also do "capstone" experiences, performing in a main stage production in our season, in-class showcases in advanced acting courses, or an internship opportunity outside CSU.

As singers, they train to practice healthy habits that support a lifetime of vocal production for the stage, screen and or recording. They also take incremental music courses, including Musicianship/Music Fundamentals, Singing for Actors, and Applied Voice lessons. All of these courses prepare the students to execute the challenges of advanced Musical Theatre practice, i.e., learning and following their vocal part in their sheet music, and interpreting their acting performance through the musical constructions the original authors laid out.

As dancers, they learn to effectively execute the kind of movement that Musical Theatre demands, either highly physical staging or dance. Students have an array of dance options, including: Tap I & II, Jazz, Ballet, African, or Modern/Styles.

The acting, music theory, and physical engagement/dance arcs culminate in TH373 Musical Theatre Workshop: Scene-to-Song, which combines voice, acting and staging/movement.

TH242 World Theatre History I course covers a vast expanse of theatre history and explores a diversity of perspectives from theatre's ancient African origins to the golden ages of English, Spanish, and French 17th century theatre, from Native American performance to the Greek and Roman blueprints of theatre. We cover a variety of performance and theatre traditions including ritual performances, global puppetry, noh, kabuki, and bunraku, kathakali dance drama, Roman bloodsports and slapstick comedy, commedia dell'arte physical theatre, medieval church and pagan performance traditions, theatrical masks, gender-bending across the historical stage, Italian and Chinese opera, Elizabethan, Jacobean and Restoration theatre, and French Neoclassical farce. Students learn about various theatrical cultural identities and heritages form across the globe, mapping similarities and differences across art forms, geographies, and time periods.

TH455 is the advanced playwriting class, which builds upon all the fundamental skills in theatrical storytelling, solving problems of character, plot, composition, and staging. It is a writing-intensive class that allows students to hone and fine tune their theatrical and dramatic writing skills through peer review and table readings (oral presentations) of their finished plays. The revision process allows students to problem solve using peer and instructor feedback.
